

ESL Program Support

This year, our intern team played a vital role in strengthening CDA's operations. Their efforts expanded organizational capacity, enhanced communication systems, and enriched the experience of both students and volunteers. Through collaborative planning, strategic coordination, and consistent operational support, they streamlined processes and helped the organization move forward with greater clarity and impact. Thanks to their dedication, our programs ran more efficiently, and our network of support grew stronger. Beyond their skills, the interns brought creativity, commitment, and heart to everything they did.

Finances

Our Expenses

In 2025, CDA invested \$104,555 in program and operational expenses to advance its mission. The largest portion supported personnel, with additional costs covering insurance, professional services, educational and operational subscriptions, and essential supplies.



Our Income

CDA generated a total of \$128,003 in income in 2025, supported by a combination of grant funding, community-based fundraising, and individual donations.

English as a Second Language Classes Building Skills and Connection Through English

In 2025, Casa de Amistad's ESL program featured two core classes, each designed to help learners strengthen their English skills in different ways.



Grammar Class

Students in both beginner and intermediate levels developed practical grammar skills and expanded everyday vocabulary.



Conversation Class

Students strengthened speaking and listening skills through interactive discussions, gaining confidence in everyday communication.

The ESL program is central to Casa de Amistad's mission, offering free classes that strengthen English skills, boost confidence, and open doors for our community members.

GED in Spanish Classes

Education for Professional Empowerment

This year, Casa de Amistad strengthened access to education through our GED program, which we continued to offer entirely in Spanish. We designed our classes to guide students toward new professional, academic, and personal opportunities, prioritizing strong support and flexibility.

We continued to offer two weekly virtual classes, providing structured instruction that accommodated students' work and family schedules. Students also utilized a computer-based study platform, enabling them to practice at their own pace and prepare fully for the exam.

The GED program continued to provide a pathway for community members to build skills, gain confidence, and pursue their educational goals.

Spanish Classes

Connecting Through Language and Culture

This year marked the second year of our Spanish Language Program for the broader Athens community. The program provided opportunities for community members, college students, and working professionals to study Spanish while exploring Latino and Hispanic cultures.

Our curriculum served beginners and students working to improve their fluency. Through grammar instruction and conversation-based practice, participants strengthened their communication skills and gained confidence using Spanish in daily life. By creating a space for language learning, the program also aimed to foster curiosity, cultural awareness, and meaningful connections among participants.

The Athens-Clarke County Library hosted our ESL classes, providing a central, welcoming space that helped learners connect, build relationships, and become active members of the community.







English as a Second Language

The ESL Program provided opportunities for English language learners in Athens to strengthen their language skills and expand their networks, welcoming participants from across Northeast Georgia. Over the Spring, Summer and Fall sessions, **167 participants** attended one or more classes at Casa de Amistad.



GED in Spanish


The General Educational Development (GED) in Spanish Program strengthened pathways to growth and opportunity for adults in our community. This year, through our Spring, Summer, and Fall sessions, Casa de Amistad served **40 unique participants**, equipping them with the academic skills needed to pursue further education and career advancement.

Power Partners ESL Program


In 2025, Casa de Amistad broadened its educational impact through a dedicated onsite ESL program designed for Spanish-speaking employees at Power Partners.

Challenges and Growth

2025 was a year of reflection, adaptation, and growth for Casa de Amistad. Like many organizations, we navigated new challenges while continuing to advance our mission of education.

External and Environmental Factors

Broader environmental challenges led Casa de Amistad to review and adapt program protocols and messaging. Changes included moving some classes online, updating communication practices, refining volunteer onboarding, and adjusting partnerships to ensure programs remained accessible, inclusive, and responsive to learners' needs. These adaptations helped Casa de Amistad continue supporting adult learners effectively amid changing circumstances.

Program Participation and Structure

Many GED students did not reach the testing stage, showing the need for cohort-based structures, small group mentorship, and focused end-goal support—changes we plan to implement in 2026. Spanish classes had limited attendance, pointing to opportunities for partnerships and delivery models better suited to workplace and professional learners.

Volunteer Engagement

Volunteers contributed over 700 hours in instruction, one-on-one support, events, and outreach. With so many new volunteers joining this year, we recognized the need to strengthen our onboarding and program infrastructure to provide consistent instruction and broaden opportunities for volunteers to support fundraising, outreach, and other programs.



Looking Ahead

In 2026, Casa de Amistad will build on 2025's achievements, strengthening programs and deepening connections with the Athens community. Ensuring consistent, high-quality instruction remains a priority, with a focus on volunteer training and program support systems. To advance this goal, we are exploring a potential partnership with UGA's Center for Multilingual-learner Education, Research, and Innovative Teaching (MERIT). If funded, this partnership would provide tools, templates, and training to enhance ESL instruction and support volunteer and instructor preparation. Volunteers will have new opportunities to engage in outreach, fundraising, and community initiatives, connecting more people to our programs and supporting the growth of our community. Recognizing the evolving needs of our community, we aim to strengthen partnerships that create opportunities for shared learning and collaboration. New program initiatives in 2026 include launching a Women's ESL Conversation Circle to help women practice English, build confidence,

and form meaningful connections, and piloting a Spanish/ESL workplace program at Power Partners (ERMCO), aimed at improving cross-cultural communication in the workplace. Additionally, our GED in Spanish program will adopt a cohort model, in which students register at the start of the term and work closely with peers and volunteer mentors, including members of the Brothers of Lambda Theta Phi Latin Fraternity, to stay motivated and reach testing goals. Through these initiatives, Casa de Amistad will continue empowering learners and strengthening the bonds that make our community thrive.
